SUPERVISOR SAFETY ACCOUNTABILITY

Supervisors and Managers have a lot to take care of, from production quotas and quality issues, to timecard tracking and human resource issues. They have a lot of tasks to accomplish. Is safety one of those tasks? It should be!

WHY SAFETY?

Safety works hand in hand with many quality enhancement programs and production issues. From ISO to Six Sigma, safety is often considered a key ingredient to a successful company. Safety assessments and controls tend to:

COSTS OF ACCIDENTS

Sharing data on costs of accidents can assist supervisors in understanding the importance of safety. Costs are typically broken down into INSURED and UNINSURED costs. Insured costs include medical bills, salary replacement and expenses. Uninsured costs can include damaged product, equipment damage, overtime, temporary labor, fines and training time.

Costs vary depending on the severity of the incident. National Safety Council statistics often point to a ratio of 5 -53 in uninsured costs for every 1 in insured costs.

WHY SUPERVISORS?

Supervisors and Managers are accountable for the actions of the employees in your organization, much like professional coaches. Leaders are necessary in any organization!
